Marilyn was awarded the Presidential Diversity Scholarship of \$120,000 at St. Lawrence University and was named a Ronald E. McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program Scholar where she

had the opportunity to participate in an 8-week faculty-mentored research internship exploring human trafficking in the context of civil war and then present her findings at the University of Buffalo 18<sup>th</sup> Annual McNair Undergraduate Research Conference. Among other accomplishments, she founded and became president of the St. Lawrence University Human Wrong Campaign organization, spearheaded *La Sociedad Hispana* on campus as Vice President, and studied abroad in Vienna, Austria and in the Yucatan Peninsula, Mexico.
